#### Church World Service Blankets for Mother's Day

#### **CWS Blankets; Comfort in times of crisis.**

Help people around the world recover from disasters and get a fresh start.

Someone like Karen, a senior citizen in Michigan whose home was flooded in 2014, or Nerline, a mother of four in Haiti, who lived in a tent for several years after the 2010 earthquake destroyed her house.



When you partner with the CWS Blankets program, you are helping our neighbors in need recover from disaster, giving them hope and the tools they need for lasting change. You are providing necessities and cleanup supplies to Karen and others impacted by stateside disasters, working with the community to rebuild their lives. You are coming alongside Nerline and others in Haiti, to construct a new home and accompany them on the long road to recovery.

Last year over 7,800 blankets were distributed worldwide. And of those 5,000 were sent to homeless shelters and agencies that help the unhoused here in the United States. Many have been sent to refugee stations in Serbia during the winter months of waiting to cross borders.

We will be taking an offering for the Blanket Ministry on May 8, Mothers Day Sunday, in recognition of the many displaced families often headed by women. Mothers Day and all-purpose cards will be available in Fellowship Hall on May 1st and May 8 during coffee hour for those who would like to take one.

#### **Discount Power Update**

The Prospect Congregational Church continues to be a Broker for Discount Power. Discount Power is a discount electricity supplier located in Shelton, CT and has now gone to a policy of only offering fixed rates to their customers.

Recently Discount Power introduced a new fixed rate program for residential customers. See below for details. Currently the Eversource rate is \$.0955/kWh. As you may or may not know, Discount Power supplies only the electricity. Eversource or UI will continue to supply your bill and all service. Discount Power will give the church \$.002 for every kWh used by our customers. This is a WIN/WIN for both the church and our customers.

Whether you are purchasing your electricity from Eversource, UI or another discounted electricity supplier, please check a recent bill to see what rate you are currently paying to determine how much money you can save. Then go to our Discount Power web site at discountpowerinc.com/pccenergy, click on the green get started button and follow their directions. Pure joy and thankfulness in completing another Boston Marathon!

Both feelings started before Louise and I even left for Boston. Thankfulness goes back to that fateful day of my first Boston in 2013. Yes, the year of the bombing. I'm not only thankful for every Boston I'm able to qualify for and complete, but for every step and breath I take. Joy is always in my heart as well, but it peaked with all the prayers and good wishes that I received from my church family that Sunday morning before leaving. This past Sunday service was about love and I can say that Louise and I feel it all the time from our church family and we feel blessed to be part of it.

Now for the race. While the secret to a good race is to run happy and relaxed, well it's easier said than done. I measured my heart rate while "relaxing" before the race and it was 78 BPM and I had not started to run yet. It's usually 58, by the way. Anyway, once the race started I think I did calm down. After all, 13,000 runners had already started and there were 17,000 behind me so I had plenty of company. Add to that probably a half million fans along the sidelines, the joy comes back fast, even though it's hard work. When it's really feeling hard, I don't stay too long in the pity party as I think about Louise and how real hard it is for her to walk just a short distance, so the thankfulness for my blessings come back fast as well.

Again to the secret for running a good marathon in particular is to run "comfortably" for the first 10 miles and I thought I accomplished that, even with the warm weather, as I crossed that mile marker in under 1 hour and 20 minutes, a nice pace. Soon after though I realized it was getting difficult to keep that pace. Luckily, just 2 miles ahead would be Wellesley College, where the girls come out and literally scream continuously for all the runners. Love is certainly in the air there! In my case, with my hearing, when I pass the last girl, since they have been screaming up the course, it goes totally silent for me.

I hit the half marathon mark at 1:46, 4 minutes off my desired pace, 3 of those planned because of the heat and the other, well actually planned also as I intended to enjoy myself thoroughly through Wellesley's "Scream Tunnel". Tiring at mile 15 I remember wishing for the downhill at mile 16 to come soon, even though right after it comes the most difficult part of the course. Four hills through the town of Newton. Only the last one has a name, "Heartbreak", but the others wear you down. Read the Prospect Pages for the details of my negotiation to make it up and over Heartbreak Hill and to mile 21. I can say here though that even with the wind coming in from Boston in my face at that point I was thankful it wasn't cold and raining like last year.

The last 5.2 miles of the course are the easiest, on paper, but that's if you have somehow managed to keep fresh legs to that point. Only in 2014, a perfect weather day, did I ever come close to it feeling "easy". At mile 24 you start to see the famous Citgo sign near Fenway Park and if you're actually fresh, even though it's a mile away, it gets bigger pretty fast. This year, well, it took awhile, but I got there and soon you pass under a big sign on an overpass, newly painted in blue and yellow, that says 1 mile to go! I don't know how fast my heart was beating at that point, but it was filled with joy and thankfulness as I knew no matter what the clock would say, I would finish the race, 2 Timothy 4:7. As you take a right on Hereford St. and the final left on Boylston St. to run the last quarter mile to the finish, it doesn't matter what condition you're in, the high spirit of the crowd makes it truly easy. 3 hours and 45 minutes was my time.

The construction loan we had from Ion Bank to cover the supply and installation of the elevator has now turned into a fixed rate mortgage. 
